Last year's graduating seniors had an unprecedented five brothers selected as top ten Greek men on campus. This year should prove to be just as successful. Already, we have two members of Mortar Board and Gamma Gamma. Two brothers received top freshman honors. Several also hold leadership positions such as OU Dad's Day chairman and director of OU Sooner Scandals. Four brothers are members of the IFC, and seven are serving terms in the Student Congress.

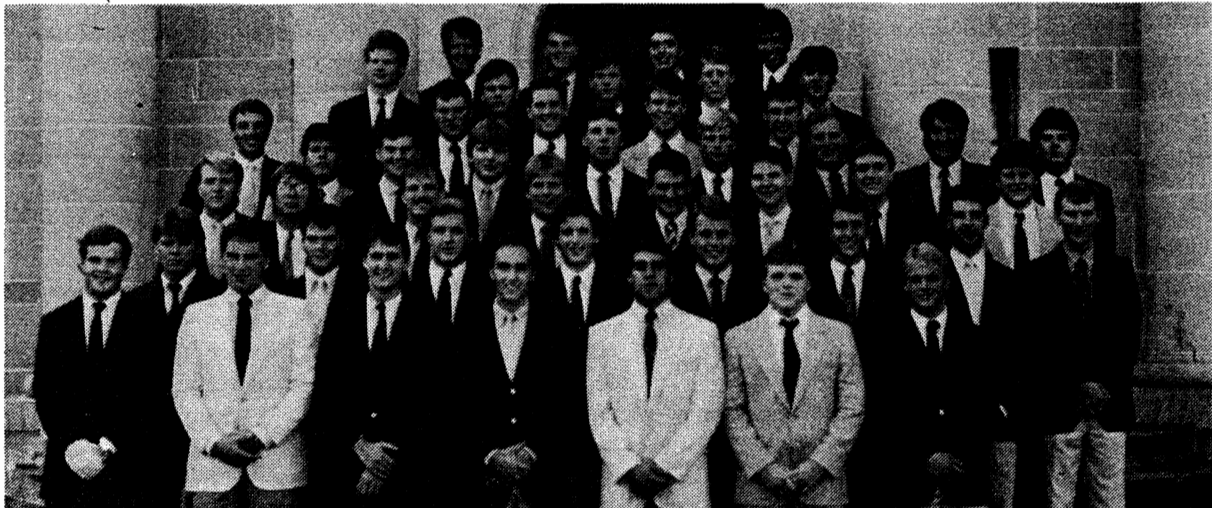
Scholarship, which enjoys a tradition of excellence at Gamma Phi, is being focused on this year. Last year's pledge class, which won top scholarship honors both semesters, should again ensure that Beta wins the coveted scholarship trophy.

Gamma Phi is also well represented in OU athletics with two pledges on the football team, one pledge on the basketball team, one member and two pledges on the wrestling team, one member playing varsity tennis, and one member running track.

Changes in state law and University of Oklahoma policies regarding alcohol have created a different atmosphere for the OU fraternity system and for Gamma Phi. The chapter has shown its leadership by quickly addressing this issue. First, due to the low number of actives who are old enough to consume alcohol and the legal liability of serving, the chapter is not purchasing alcohol as an organization. Second, Gamma Phi has formed a constructive but traditional pledge program. This has been very successful and, to date, we have 45 pledges (the maximum number allowed).
