CHAPTER SIGNS 55 OUSTANDING PLEDGES DURING SUMMER RUSH

In Fall 2003, Gamma
Phi signed yet another outstanding
pledge class of 55 young men to
conclude what was one of the
chapter's most successful rush
efforts in recent memory. This
year's pledge class is the result of
hard work of the 2003 rush chairmen, Michael Kurtz (Oklahoma
City '05), Zane Weaver (Ardmore
'05), Tyson Carroll (Henryetta
'06), and William Crosby
(Ardmore '06), as well as many
other active members and alumni.

Gamma Phi was one of only two O.U. fraternities to sign its full quota of new pledges during 2003 formal rush, and this year's pledge class is again considered the best on campus. Academically, the pledge class boasts over a 26 average ACT score, and the class includes nine University or Regent Scholars, seven members of the President's Leadership Class, and six valedictorians. The class is complimented by a number of fine athletes, including three all-state award recipients, and members of both the current O.U. track and football teams. A complete list of the young men who pledged in Fall 2003 accompanies this newsletter, and it includes 16 legacies, including seven Beta sons: John Barghols (father Steve Barghols '73); Ryan Berry (father John Berry '64): Ryan Collins (father Lorenzo Collins '79); Brent

Gathright (father Cary Gathright '82); Steve Harral (father Don Harral '71); James Klabzuba (father Bob Klabzuba '71); and Paul Schroedter (father Tom Schroedter, Duke '76).

The chapter also expanded the geographic diversity of its membership with this year's pledge class, signing young men from Boise City, Oklahoma, to Charlotte, North Carolina. Significant inroads were also made in Tulsa with the signing of several outstanding young men. At the same time, the chapter also took advantage of what many consider to be one of its traditional strong points by signing almost twice as many young men as a year ago from Oklahoma towns outside the Oklahoma City and Tulsa metropolitan areas. The chapter also maintained a strong presence in the Texas schools, from where an increasing number of new freshman arrive each year at O.U.

Over the last several years, Gamma Phi has consistently signed the best pledge classes on campus, and the results are evident. Recent successes in rush are the primary reasons the chapter is dominating again in all areas of campus life - academics, leadership, athletics and social. The IFC Scholarship Cup is again becoming a permanent fixture at 800 Chautauqua, thanks to the recruit-

ment of top quality men through rush.

One of the keys to successful rush is the unparalleled support provided by Gamma Phi alumni. Generous financial contributions, which collectively exceeded \$25,000 from almost 200 donors, enabled the chapter to maintain a strong rush throughout the summer and into the critical formal rush period at the end of August. A list of financial contributors is included in this newsletter, and the chapter extends a most sincere thanks for the continued support of rush by Gamma Phi alumni from across the nation. In addition to making financial contributions, several alums went out of their way to assist in hosting rush functions or providing other support during the summer. Jay Fitzgerald ('84), Scot Sullivan ('88), Steve Miller ('72), John Bell ('83) and Danny Jordan ('78) hosted summer BBQ's, and Tulsa-area rush advisor, Dave Hughes ('87), provided invaluable support in the chapter's efforts to increase its presence in the Tulsa area. -cont

BROTHER RUNS MARATHON TO FIGHT CANCER

Dear Beta Brothers: I have decided to run in the Music City marathon to raise funds for the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society. I initially heard about this organization in college when I found out that my fraternity brother and future college roommate suffered from Leukemia. Jonathan Paley was a member of the 1989 pledge class and graduated in 1992 Summa Cum Laude with a BBA in Marketing and Management Information Systems. While at OU, he received numerous awards and honors including the Letzeiser medal for being one of the top ten graduating seniors at the University. Jon was named to Alpha Lamba Delta, Golden Key, Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities, OU honors program and Mortar Board. But more important than all of that, Jon was a wonderful person. His sense of humor is something that will always stay with me. During

our pledge year, Jon would often ask to be excused from early morning activities in order to make his 8:00 am tee time. After getting rejected by one girl or another, he would always tell me not to take it personally as it was just my personality she didn't like. Jon also had a wisdom and a reflective side that could give anyone pause. He and I had several theological discussions. Some of these discussions changed my life. He was initially diagnosed with Leukemia at age 14 and lived with it on and off until his death on January 29, 1998 at age 27. After we graduated, he asked me to participate in the National Marrow Donor Program (which finds unrelated donors for those in need). Bone marrow drives were held in 1996 when Jon relapsed. As a result of these drives, over 500 people joined the donor program. A year and a half ago, I was an initial bone marrow match for an individual struggling with a blood born disease (like Leukemia and/or Lymphoma). Although I was not a final match, I always felt that I needed to do something more to honor Jon. As you may or may not know, leukemia is the #1 disease killer of children and the leading fatal malignant disease of men and women under the age of 35. Over the past 20 years, death rates for leukemia have fallen by 21% for US men and women under the age of 65. Although the cause of leukemia remains unknown, steady advances in research bring us closer to a cure every day. I am personally trying to raise

\$4,000 for the Society by April 1, 2004. The Society supports patients who are struggling with blood born diseases through education, funding research, and hospital visitation support. 75% of the money donated directly helps current and future patients. If you would like to make a donation, any amount would be appreciated. All donations are tax deductible and should be written to the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society, and sent to my home address listed below. (Your cancelled check counts as your legal documenta-

I have begun training to prepare for the marathon that will be held in April 2004. This marathon will be a great challenge, but I am most excited about the opportunity to represent my friend and Beta brother.

LOOKING BACK

75 years ago (Fall 1928) — Mrs. Ned B. Miller served as Housemother. The new house at 800 Chautauqua was being completed. John Reed Pearson was President of Pe-et, President of the Interfraternity Council, Business Manager of the Sooner yearbook and manager of the football team. Bill Noble was on the basketball team. District Chief Fisher Muldrow (1921, #126) reported to Dr. Francis W. Shepardson that 95 of the 307 men initiated by the Gamma Phi chapter "have come from Beta families."

50 years ago (Fall 1953) – Mrs. W. P. Vick began her first semester as Housemother. She would continue as Housemother for 15 years. Fred Wewerka was Chapter President. Merrill Green ("the All-American Substitute") helped the 1953 Big Seven Champion Sooners to an 8-1-1 record in their regular season, losing only to Notre Dame in the season opener. The Sooners went on to beat Maryland (the mythical national champions) 7-0 in the Orange Bowl on New Year's Day 1954.

25 years ago (Fall 1978) – Oklahoma Sain served the Housemother. Bob Naifeh was Chapter President. John Raley was an offensive guard on the 1978 Big Eight Co-Champion Sooner team that compiled a 10-1 regular season record and avenged their only loss by defeating Nebraska 31-24 in the Orange Bowl on New Year's day 1979.

Wooglin Smiles - Louis Victor Priebe (1964, #1090)

Louis Priebe heads Priebe PR, a Washington, D. C. consulting firm that advises trade and professional associations, foundations, business, religious institutions and public service agencies on how to attain public awareness, interest, understanding and support. His career has included arranging meetings with the President in the Oval Office and cabinet room of the White House.

Louis is a native of Enid. After graduating from Enid High School in 1959, he enrolled at OU. He was initiated as #1090 on the Chapter Roll on October 23, 1960. He graduated from OU in 1964 with a degree in Journalism and left Oklahoma to serve in the U.S. Army at Fort Benning, GA. He moved to Washington, D.C. in 1970, where he has enjoyed a successful career in public relations, winning a Silver Anvil Award and serving as the President of the National Capital Chapter of the Public Relations Society of America in 1980. In 1981 he was president of the 800-member Oklahoma State Society of Washington, D.C.

In 1989, Chili USA, a Washington, D.C.-based group led by Louis and R. N. Dunagan III, convinced U.S. Rep. Glenn English of Cordell to co-sponsor legislation making chili the official food of the United States. Chili has continued to hold a significant place in his life. In January 2002 he helped screen potential cooks for the National Press Club's "Super Bowl of Chili" on February 2nd of that year.

Louis was selected as one of America's "100 top PR Superstars"

in 1990 and one of the nation's 17 top association practitioners in 1992 by the Public Relations Quarterly. He has been honored as a Distinguished Alumnus of the OU School of Journalism and Mass Communications.

On January 19, 2001, Lou was presented with a Governor's Commendation from Oklahoma Governor Frank Keating in recognition of his significant service in Washington, D.C. to the State of Oklahoma during the past quarter century and to the Republican Party with great gratitude for his loyalty, dedication and effectiveness.

The Mayor of the District of Columbia, Anthony A. Williams, formally proclaimed December 12, 2002, as "LOUIS VICTOR PRIEBE DAY" in Washington, D.C. in recognition of his substantive professional accomplishments and his extraordinary service toward the enrichment of life in the Metropolitan Washington, D.C. area. On that day he was also inducted into the National Capital Public Relations Hall of Fame. Brother Priebe became the 53rd inductee into the select fraternity of Washinton's top PR practitioners.

"Bill Longmire (1934) established the first privately owned laundry in the basement of the Beta house. I purchased it in 1937. This laundry did all the chapter's laundry – linens, bed sheets, etc. but I can't remember at what cost. At that time the weekly charge for personal laundry was \$5.00 per week for up to seven shirts a week and all your underclothes, handkerchiefs and socks, which was very profitable at that time. DONORS CAMPAIGN UNDER WAY

Since its founding in 1907, Gamma Phi has endured as an institution not quite like any other at the University of Oklahoma. Much more than simply a social organization or residence hall, we are a fraternity which has forged lifelong friendships and enriched the university experience – and indeed the lives – of thousands of young men.

Surely, this is a tradition worth preserving. Such is the goal of our Beta Donors Program, which Gamma Phi alumni first organized in 1983. During the ensuing 20 years, growing numbers of alumni have generously joined in our annual Beta Donors campaigns to not only maintain of the Chapter House at 800 Chautauqua, but also to preserve the traditions of Gamma Phi for future generations.

We are midway through our 2003-04 Donors' Campaign. Thus far, 234 alumni from 54 classes have contributed \$40,890.00 for the cause of Gamma Phi. This is a tremendous response. John Orr '34, Don Cies '59, Dan Moody '69, Fred Turner '72. G.R. Talley '74 and Mike Scherlag '90 deserve special recognition and thanks for their gifts of \$1,000.00 or more. To date, the Class of '85 is setting the pace with 13 donors, followed closely by the Classes of '72 and '74 (12 donors each) and the Class of '71 (11 donors).

Although the response so far is gratifying, the Donors' Campaign continues, and we hope that yet more alumni will pledge their support. If you haven't yet joined the campaign, please consider doing so.

There remain many needed repairs and improvements for the Chapter House. The main electrical box is antiquated, out of code and maxed out; the clay-tiled roof has several leaks which need prompt repair; additional exterior lighting and a surveil-lance camera system are needed to prevent repeats of the recent vandalism incident; a new flame grill is needed for the kitchen; the HVAC system serving the formal dining area and basement needs replacement; new guttering is needed around the rear perimeter of the roof to preserve the facade below.

These are only the highlights. Other needs and "surprise" items will inevitably arise.

On behalf of the Gamma Phi Chapter, many thanks to all of you who have participated in this year's Donors Campaign. You are doing much to not only preserve our historic Chapter House, but also to continue the tradition of excellence at 800 Chautauqua. -continued page 6

James Elder named 2003 Alumnus of the Year

The Gamma Phi Chapter has recognized James Elder '69 as its 2003 Alumnus of the Year. The Chapter presented this award to Elder at the 20th annual Beta Donors' Reception on November 1, 2003.

As many of our alumni know very well, it would be difficult to overstate the magnitude of Elder's many contributions to Gamma Phi. Dating back to the mid-70s, Elder has remained actively involved with the Chapter in various capacities. He has been a member of the Housing Corporation's board of trustees for a collective 21 years and running. From 1983 through 1988, he served as Chapter Counselor. Most recently, Elder was president of the Housing Corporation from 1995 through 2002.

Elder was instrumental in the creation of the Beta Donors' Program, the program which has been a catalyst for the Chapter House's physical renaissance over the past several years. He was among the group of alumni responsible for the Chapter House's placement on the National Register of Historic Places. He also has been largely responsible for numerous major improvements to the Chapter House. Over several years, Elder was the driving force behind many long and challenging reforms at Gamma Phi, reforms to which many observers attribute the Chapter's present day success. He became corporation president at a time when Gamma Phi faced unprecedented challenges and presided over the Chapter's return to supremacy on the OU campus.

As impressive as this list of his accomplishments may be, it doesn't begin to truly convey the scope of Elder's unrivaled leadership and dedication. For nearly all of his postgraduate life, James Elder has selflessly given enormous amounts of his time and efforts to Gamma Phi, motivated only the Chapter's well being. Congratulations to Brother Elder for this well-deserved recognition.




