THE RUSH GOES ON – ALUMNI SUPPORT NEEDED NOW FOR 2006 BETA RUSH!

2006 Rush Team Ready To Begin Summer Rush

ter, and the need for broad-based alumni support through both active participation in financial assistance.

The chapter has taken the first step toward a successful rush in 2006 by electing another outstanding Rush Team: Head Rush Chairman Theo Coleman (Carrollton Creekview '08): Assistant Rush Chairmen Jordan Carter (Kingston '09), John Gawey (Tulsa '09) and Lane Gibbs (Madill '09); and Rush Secretary Cory Christofferson (Edmond '09). The chapter's alumni advisory team for rush is also changing this year. Matt Clouse '01, who served as a rush chairman in 1999, is taking over as the new Chapter Rush Advisor for Rob Robertson '84, who has held the position the last several years. Brother Robertson will continue to assist Brother Clouse this summer, and alumni with referrals, rush contributions or an interest in supporting Beta Rush activities this summer, should feel free to contact either Matt Clouse (mclouse@vbank.com; 405.286.5720), or Rob Robertson

Each year presents new challenges for the active members and alumni who support Gamma Phi's rush program. In May 2005, the rules regarding summer rush were changed to effectively prohibit any rush function where more than five rushees were present, unless the event was preregistered with the IFC and alumni were in efforts of the past several years, this year's

attendance. Gamma Phi's alumni responded enthusiastically to the call for help, and the Betas were able to host 16 rush functions in Tulsa, Oklahoma City, Norman, Ardmore, Edmond and Colleyville, Texas. These events allowed last year's rush team to get their foot in the door early and often, and were one of the keys to signing another outstanding pledge class in the fall of 2005. This year, the rush team's goal is to have the opportunity to hold 20 alumni-hosted functions between the official start of summer rush on June 1, 2006, and the conclusion of summer rush in mid-August 2006. This translates into hosting at least two alumni events each week during the approximate 10-week period of summer rush, so many alumni volunteers will be needed.

Changes in the format of summer rush the summer rush process, as well as critical have also required extraordinary efforts on the part of the rush chairmen, and a corresponding increase in the financial costs of competing in rush. The contact limitations imposed by IFC outside of the preregistered, alumni-hosted functions, require extensively greater travel on the part of the entire rush team, as well as for other active members who participate in the summer rush effort. Additionally, with a steady increase in the number of highly qualified rushees coming to OU from outof-state, the chapter's rush efforts can no longer focus solely on Oklahoma. For years, our rush chairmen have been required to not only recruit the major metropolitan areas in Oklahoma, but also continue to recruit the smaller Oklahoma cities and towns, which have consistently sent quality young men to the Beta House at OU. In recent years, Texas has been added to the mix for summer rush, and the chapter must become more active "south of the border" to compete with the other top fraternities. Each year has seen an increase in enrollment of Texas freshmen at OU, and each year more and more Gamma Phi legacies return from Texas to attend OU. The chapter held its first "official" rush party in the Dallas/Fort Worth area in 2005, and the rush team hopes to add a rush function in the Houston area to the list in 2006.

To continue to build on successful rush

rush team needs three things, which can be considered the "holy trinity" for supporting a successful rush program at OU: (1) referrals of qualified young men who may be participating in fraternity rush in 2006 (please include, at minimum, name, high school, telephone number, high school GPA and ACT/SAT score); (2) financial **contributions** to fund the many expenses associated with rush, which begin with phone bills in the early spring and end with new pledge t-shirts handed out on bid night in late August; and (3) volunteers to sponsor alumni-hosted events during the summer.

Most alumni understand the necessity for referrals and financial contributions, both of which are desperately needed and greatly appreciated. The need for alumni volunteers to regularly participate in summer rush is relatively new. Alumni-hosted functions are certainly not new to rush. However, in years past they were fairly limited in number, and the rush team was free to hold rush functions (many impromptu) without alumni participation. With the recent changes to IFC's rush guidelines, pre-registered alumni-hosted functions are essentially the only way the rush team can meet with more than five rushees at one time. Considering that nearly 1,000 young men go through rush each year at OU, it would be impossible for the rush team to meet, much less get to know, even a fraction of the rushees without the benefit of alumni-hosted barbeques.

"So, what is involved in hosting a summer rush function?" If you are under the impression that alumni-hosted rush functions resemble the infamous Toga Party scene in Animal House, or the "house party" scene in Old School, your perception could not be further from the truth. First, the IFC rules prevent any females from attending; second, the IFC rules strictly prohibit the service of alcohol; and, third, the rushees usually do not wear togas or streak through the neighborhood at the end of the night. These are typically casual "backyard" or "poolside" events that take place on an evening selected by the host, usually between Wednesday and Saturday. The functions typically start early, around (Continued on page 10)

As the spring semester daws to a close, we have wrapped up our 22nd Beta Donors campaign with great success. No less than **335** donors contributed **\$53,435** to the cause of preserving 800 Chautauqua. This is a tremendous testament for our alumni support as we near Gamma Phi's 100th anniversary as a Beta chapter. Many thanks to all of you.

The Class of 58 captured the honor of having the most Donors, with 17. The Classes of 69, 71, 72, 73, 74, 78, 79, 82 and 85 also had outstanding levels of participation with each having at least 10 donors. Additionally, Brothers John Orr '34, William Obering '57, Dan Moody '69, Rich Talley '74 and Kevin Foxx '78 deserve special recognition for their generous gifts of \$1,000 each. Certainly, we are sincerely grateful to each and every one of our Donors for their support.

Of course, Donor funds are used to finance improvements and repairs to the Beta house. As usual, there are many needs in this regard, and we're presently assembling our summer project list. Candidates include installation of a flame grill in the kitchen, resurfacing the parking lot, repairing the back limestone façade, resurfacing the basketball court, expanding the exterior lighting, repainting the upstairs hallways and doors, replacement of the remaining old flat steel room doors with paneled steel doors, repainting the north and south fire escapes, repairing and painting the portico ceiling, repainting the exterior window frames and mullions and repairing leaks in the backside guttering. I'm sure we'll find a few others to add to the list.

None of these are particularly flashy, but they all need to be done. Thanks to our generous Beta Donors, we can afford to perform most of them.
